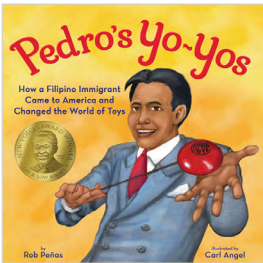

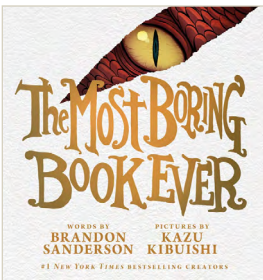


Pedro's Yo-Yos: How a Filipino Immigrant Came to America and Changed the World of Toys
